

# FOREWORD FROM ARCHBISHOP MARK COLERIDGE



"In the pages that follow you can read the story of what faith is achieving now, a story of bold decisions, hard work and great generosity."

It's astonishing to think of the effect the Catholic Church has had in Brisbane since the first bishop came from Ireland in 1861. When Bishop James Quinn arrived in Brisbane, his first question was, "Where is the city?" He had every reason to ask, because Brisbane was hardly more than a shanty town, far from the bustling metropolis we know today.

Bishop Quinn and the five Mercy Sisters who followed from Dublin nourished the community in faith; they planted the seeds. They were not well-resourced; the seeds they sowed were humble.

The Catholic community here has known hard times – not just in the early days but through it all. Our Catholic forebears never baulked at bold decisions or hard work, which is why the Archdiocese has been so blessed. Through all the challenges and changes, the power of faith has triumphed.

We need only look at the buildings – the schools, the hospitals, the cathedral and the many churches – to see the physical signs of what has been accomplished. But the story continues; it's not just a thing of the past. In the pages that follow you can read the story of what faith is achieving now, a story of bold decisions, hard work and great generosity.

Today we see an Archdiocese that has borne fruit because of seeds planted by those who went before us. To them we owe an immense debt of gratitude. Following in their footsteps in very different times, we hope and pray that in the soil of south-east Queensland we too can plant good seed that will bear great fruit.

I ask that you join me in holding in prayer all those who have spread God's love and mercy by sharing their resources with the Catholic Foundation or dedicating their energies to its indispensable work.



# St Dympna's Catholic Primary School shines in fundraising

The community at St Dympna's Catholic Primary School in Aspley is made up of around 400 dedicated families, who participate in a variety of fundraisers to support local and Catholic causes.

To raise funds for the Church students enjoyed a family-friendly night out at the disco, with all the latest hits on high rotation. Proceeds totalled over \$2,000 and were donated to the 2015 Annual Catholic Campaign.




### A small parish with a large impact – Catherine at Kangaroo Point takes on the task of parish Ambassador

When Kangaroo Point parish secretary, Catherine Goldsworthy, was approached to advocate the Annual Catholic Campaign she took on the task of parish ambassador with gusto. "I thought I would try to lift the game, go in and just learn everything that I could."

St Benedict's, East Brisbane and St Joseph's, Kangaroo Point has a largely elderly demographic, with a small but growing number of young families attending Mass from the local school. "In the last 12 months the Little Altar Servers has risen from 4 children to 14," reports Catherine. But that wasn't the only development of 2015. Last September during the Annual Catholic Campaign parishioners' contributions increased tenfold on 2014 making its donations the largest percentage increase for any parish in the Archdiocese.

"Even though we are only a little parish I like to see that we can hold our own and be proud of what we are able to put toward a good cause," says Catherine.



# A man of action with a charitable heart – Colin believes firmly in working for the mission of Church

All his life Colin Apelt has had an interest in helping others. Fifty years ago, he and a team of friends volunteered to beat world poverty and hunger, a lofty goal he now realised he may have tackled rather naively. However Colin's initial enthusiasm didn't wear thin; with the help of others he went on to set up a non-profit that sponsors children in developing countries worldwide, and was later awarded the Medal of the Order of Australia for his work

The retired professor of engineering not only contributes to the Annual Catholic Campaign as a monthly supporter, he also lends a hand as a parish ambassador for his local Holy Family Parish in Indooroopilly.

"Our Pope keeps saying the Church must become more outward looking, I would like to see more of this. We need to take care of the day to day operations, but I see so much need out there for what the Church has to offer," says Colin.


With their talents and interest in theology and hospitality, it was a natural fit for the duo to begin hosting informal dinners at home with fellow parishioners, priests and academics of theology. Soon they realised the lively, often intense, but always fascinating discussions would be of interest to a wider audience beyond their living room.

Inspired by the meeting of many great minds, Libby and Paul, assisted by Father David Pascoe, engaged guest speakers and began welcoming 40-50 patrons at their events, called Theology in the City, held in the CBD at St Stephen's. These evenings are especially helpful to Brisbane Catholic Education teachers seeking accredited Professional Development in Religious Education.

"This grant is such a blessing. Our attendees desire to be challenged, to explore, to question and to engage in the faith with academics, clergy, religious and other experts in the field," says Libby.

"I encouraged Paul and Libby to pursue their idea to have a lecture series at the Cathedral because I saw a real need to bring the intellectual dimension of our faith to the fore. The Cathedral is in a good, central location – I believe it should serve as a hub for people to deepen their knowledge of the faith."

# Your gifts provided for young veterans and their families

Veterans Care Association was founded in July 2014, with Archbishop Coleridge's blessing, recognising that many veterans had little access to resources by way of spiritual, emotional and pastoral support.

In applying for a grant, the organisation hoped to address these needs for many of the 25,000 exservice men and women living in the Archdiocese. As the majority of returned injured or ill veterans are young people in their twenties with young families, this registered charity focuses on addressing the needs of this critical demographic.

This unique organisation provides an invaluable service not offered elsewhere in Queensland, and closes the gap between in-service chaplain assistance and the activities of the RSL.

Veterans participating have access to a Catholic volunteer who will pray for them, care for them and offer them unwavering support. Significantly, veterans with access to pastoral care are proven to develop more independence and resilience in future life.

This grant, which was funded by the Whelan Family Endowment Fund, provides a vital step in empowering veterans to enjoy lifelong health, welfare and emotional wellbeing.

The seminary has gone from strength to strength under Monsignor's leadership, and the new centre was made possible by a capital works campaign to ensure the seminary remains in excellent financial shape for future vocational training.

The new multi-purpose centre built through your generosity will become a hub for seminarian education.



"The book I enjoyed reading most this year was A Story of a Love by Bishop Patrick Ahern. It's a compilation of letters exchanged between Saint Thérèse of Lisieux and her friend Maurice Belliere, who was a young seminarian. Maurice had written to the Mother Superior asking for a nun to pray for him and the Mother chose Thérèse. The two corresponded and Thérèse prayed for his vocation until her death - I thought it was a beautiful story of friendship and the power of prayer."



## On the completed building.

"When Xavier Hall was completed the first thing that stood out to me was its capacity for hospitality. It's an incredible state of the art facility for lectures and study, but we frequently use it to eat together every Thursday evening and Monday lunch with all the staff and seminarians. I remember the old dining room was so small that we couldn't fit others around the table - let alone ourselves. Whereas, the new Hall has room for guests and visitors all the time - it's a great place to commune."

Barbara and John Watt's business ventures in real estate and a youth sports centre have given them a window into the more disadvantaged socio-economic areas of Brisbane. They have seen the heart-breaking effects of family breakdown, child neglect and on more the one occasion, Barbara witnessed brutal domestic violence when visiting tenants. "We have seen the brokenness of society and as the Church we must be at the coalface of this brokenness," says Barbara.

Barbara and John couldn't bear to turn a blind eye on families who had it tough. They do

what they can to help people experiencing debilitating social challenges through their philanthropic support to Centacare and other programs.

John says with a smile, "When we owned our sports centre I think it was broken into 18 times – it was always the local kids. They were neglected or hungry and they would get in to steal things like Mars Bars".

They discovered that the best way to keep them out of mischief was to involve them in squash and foster positive interactions with local police officers through sport at their centre. Sweeping the squash and tennis courts as punishment for theft was a far more beneficial than the alternative.

A favourite memory from recent times involved one young man catching up with Barb and John at a parish event – he introduced his young family and said "see this woman kids, this is Barbara and she's the one who kept your Dad out of jail."

With the support of people like Barb and John, Centacare can look forward to creating more stories of hope and a better future for families.



# THE MARY MACKILLOP BRISBANE CATHOLIC SCHOOL ACCESS FUND

Funded by Annual Catholic Campaign donations of \$232,342 in 2015, together with a further \$283,260 received from other fundraising activities, the Mary MacKillop Brisbane Catholic School Access Fund this year received a total of \$515,602.

## Your donations have helped Lisa.

In 2015, five additional students were selected for the MacKillop bursary. The fund is designated to help students from families who are in great financial need. The bursary provides a Catholic education for the child, and as a result it brings some relief to the struggling family.

Lisa is one of these five deserving students. Lisa's grandfather is the sole caregiver of his three grandchildren. They're an indigenous family who attend their local Catholic parish. He has supported the girls for the past 5 years, since their move from the bush, and although employed, has significant financial struggles. This faithful man did all he could to send the girls to a Catholic primary school because Catholic education was deeply important to him. This year, as his eldest granddaughter prepared to start Year 7, he desperately wanted her to continue in a Catholic school.

This deserving young girl, along with four other students, joined the 2015 cohort, bringing the total enrolment to 17 bursary students. These children are in 8 different schools across the Archdiocese. It's only the third year of the fund. This growth has been possible through the generosity of donors, school principals and local parish priests who have championed this cause.



Ashley and Shirley Goldsworthy are passionate about the importance of a Catholic education. Having both been taught by various religious orders throughout their schooling, they speak fondly of their formative years, receiving spiritual and academic guidance from the nuns and brothers so integral to the teaching landscape in past generations.

The strong foundation Catholic schools provided for their own faith and education has led them to establish an endowment that aims to give the gift of a Catholic education to those children who otherwise would miss out due to financial restrictions.

Although Ashley's parents were not in a financial position to send him to university, together with the support of his wife Shirley and their young growing family, Ashley studied part time and has since completed degrees from the University of Queensland, Griffith University, Australian Catholic

Ashley and Shirley credit a Catholic education as an integral part of nurturing faith in younger generations, and firmly believe it is the greatest gift you can give a child.

Ashley concedes that unfortunately there will always be too great a demand for bursaries from families who cannot afford to send their children to a Catholic primary school. However, with the Goldsworthy's generosity and ongoing support from the wider Archdiocese, many more children will now be blessed with a primary Catholic education, ensuring new generations of children continue to nurture their blossoming faith.

# Launch of the Catholic Foundation Parish Match Program

The Archdiocese of Brisbane is committed to helping parishes build up financial sustainability to fund ministry. One of the best ways to create future funding streams is through a parish endowment. In 2015, the Parish Match Program was launched, which began in several parishes, such as St Oliver Plunkett's Catholic Parish at Cannon Hill. Through to 31 December 2016, in order to help start permanent endowments for parishes, the Archdiocese will match the first \$10,000 contributed by a parish in order to reach the minimum balance of \$20,000 required to establish an endowment fund.\*

\*\$50,000 is the standard minimum for establishing an endowment, however the amount has been lowered for this Program to give all parishes – regardless of size – an opportunity to participate.

### What is an endowment?

An endowment is a fund that generates income to a charitable organisation forever, ensuring a sustainable financial future. An endowment is opened with a financial gift from an individual or agency. Donors may select a beneficiary organisation or ministry as the designated recipient of the annual endowment distribution.

### Why create a parish endowment?

We are called to be good stewards of our Church, and must secure necessary funds to cover today's expenses as well as factoring in the future cost of maintaining the property and programs in future years. Endowments provide a permanent and stable source of income, and ensure the ongoing viability of your parish.



### **HIGHLIGHTS OF 2015**

Looking back over the last year I am delighted to report the Catholic Foundation has made substantial progress in its mission to resource the good works of the Church in the Archdiocese of Brisbane. Overall, the Foundation raised over \$4.1 million in donations and received more than \$3.2 million in bequests in 2015.

The Foundation also piloted an exciting new program for parishes; the Parish Endowment Match Program which builds on one of the long-term goals of the Foundation to create permanent funding for Catholic agencies and parishes. This initiative has already been met with keen support from participating parishes, sustaining their financial futures and allowing good ministry work to continue in perpetuity. This opportunity is now available to all parishes in the Archdiocese and will continue to be implemented in 2016.

The ongoing growth of the Annual Catholic Campaign demonstrates the immense generosity of the faithful throughout the Archdiocese. This Campaign has not just succeeded but flourished with an impressive \$1.13 million in funds raised. These donations will directly benefit the education, health and retirement needs of seminarians and priests, Catholic social services, Catholic education bursaries for needy children, and grants for grassroots ministries.

Your support of the Church in whatever capacity – great and small, prayerful and financial – helps to strengthen the Catholic community. I hope that you feel encouraged reading this report knowing that your participation was integral to the success of these activities in 2015.

## **Principal Activities**

The Catholic Foundation manages all philanthropic activities of the Archdiocese of Brisbane, and works to inspire charitable giving in order to support the spiritual, educational, and social needs of the Church. The Foundation aims to increase financial efficiency and provide a secure ongoing income for essential Church activities with sound investments and dynamic fundraising initiatives.

### Income

Income was generated via gifts, endowments, appeals and bequests, totalling \$7,361,883. Of this, \$1,133,590 was received through the Annual Catholic Campaign; \$1,450,264 was donated to the Holy Spirit Seminary; \$273,386 was donated to Centacare; \$198,590 to the Priests Foundation; and, \$283,260 was contributed to the Mary MacKillop Brisbane Catholic School Access Fund. The Hardship Relief Fund was established to enable tax-deductible gifts to emergency appeals, \$2,870 was donated for the purposes of Refugee Relief in 2015. A total of \$3,246,595 was given through bequests made to the Archdiocese, while \$659,875 was received through endowments from parishes and donors.

## Sponsorships & Memberships

Activities within the Foundation also generated revenue. Income from Assembly of Catholic Professionals memberships totalled \$68,951, while sponsorships totalled \$25,752. Sponsorships for the Mary MacKillop Brisbane Catholic School Access Fund came to a total of \$18,750.

### **Endowment Growth**

The earnings on parish and donor endowments in 2015 amounted to \$211,644.

### Expenses

The costs of staffing, administration and other indirect costs of fundraising of the Resource Development Office of the Catholic Foundation continued to be underwritten by contributions of two Archdiocesan agencies.

Direct costs from fundraising campaigns and appeals, the Holy Spirit Seminary Capital Campaign and the Assembly of Catholic Professionals were applied to the campaign or event. The net costs of fundraising were approximately 11% of the total income earned in 2015.
