Welcoming new priests to our faith

After many years at Holy Spirit Seminary, deacons Jack Ho, William Aupito Iuliano and Francis Fernandes are ready to serve the Church as they prepare for the priesthood. These men of God have been supporter through your prayers, donations and care, and are now ready to move to the next phase of their formation.

“I have a sense that without the call of God, without the support of the Church and the support of all the people around me, it would have been impossible to get to this point”, said Jack.

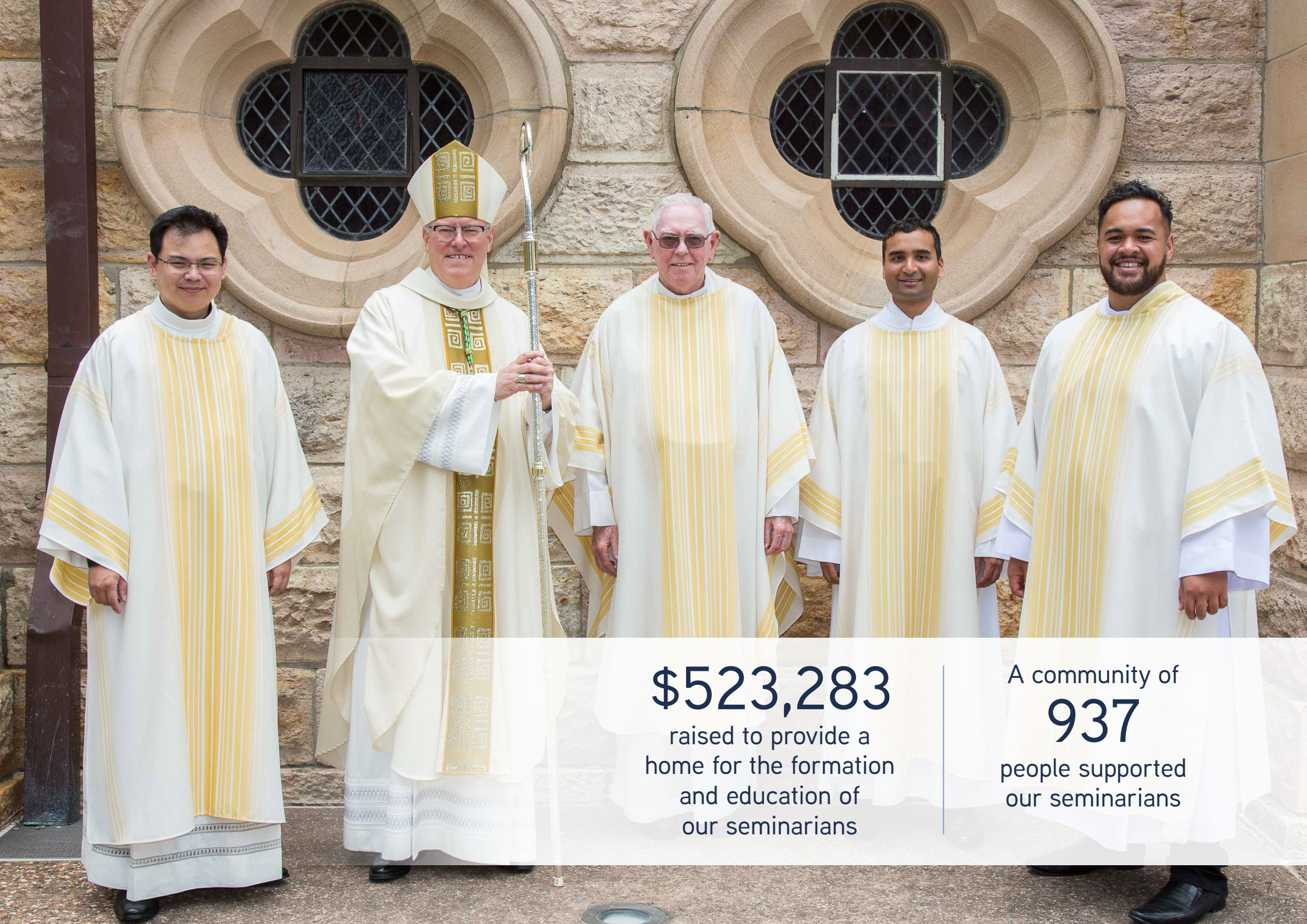
Deacon Iuliano said he and his deacon brothers had been in preparation for a long time and that for him, there is a “great excitement in the air” for the future.

The deacons were placed in parishes directly after their ordinations, and will spend twelve months learning and growing in the communities they serve.

Deacon Fernandes said it was a “deeply humbling” experience to lay down on the floor and be prayed over during the Litany of the Saints. “I was just staring at the floor and there was something humbling about having the Church around me, physically but also spiritually, praying for us,” he said.

In his homily, Bishop Ken reminded the deacons that they are not alone. “For you, the gift specially given, is to be pastors but not to do this alone,” he said. “Do this with the apostles, evangelists and teachers so that there is a unity in the works of service.”

This is an important aspect of the MacKillop Bursary Fund – that students are provided with a supportive and caring Catholic community. A ‘family’ that encourages them to reach their potential. Caring for 'senior priests' in our Archdiocese

Getting older is a slow and gradual process. New aches and pains seem to manifest daily, and in some cases, they are as unexpected as they are unwanted! But these aches and pains don't slow our retired priests down much. In December 2020, we gathered a big group of our retired priests for Christmas lunch. Archbishop Mark made the comment that, while many of these men of God are now frail, they are still actively involved in ministry. Despite the limitations of the flesh, their spirits are lively, and their vocational calling has never faded. These men have lived their lives in service to God and His people and find it almost impossible to stop.

Jokingly, the men in the room dubbed themselves 'senior priests' rather than retired ones. And this is true. Combined, they have said more than 180,000 Masses. They have heard confessions of every kind, and have given advice and guidance for every concern and fear. They have built communities and helped people find love, compassion and care.

Through the Priests Foundation, you ensure these men have access to a nurse and the healthcare they need when their bodies start refusing to cooperate. You make sure they have a home that is suitable to their ability and needs. You give them the peace of mind that, when the time comes, their retirement will be dignified. Donations like yours tells them they are still needed and valued, and because of you, they keep answering the calling in their hearts without fear or doubt.

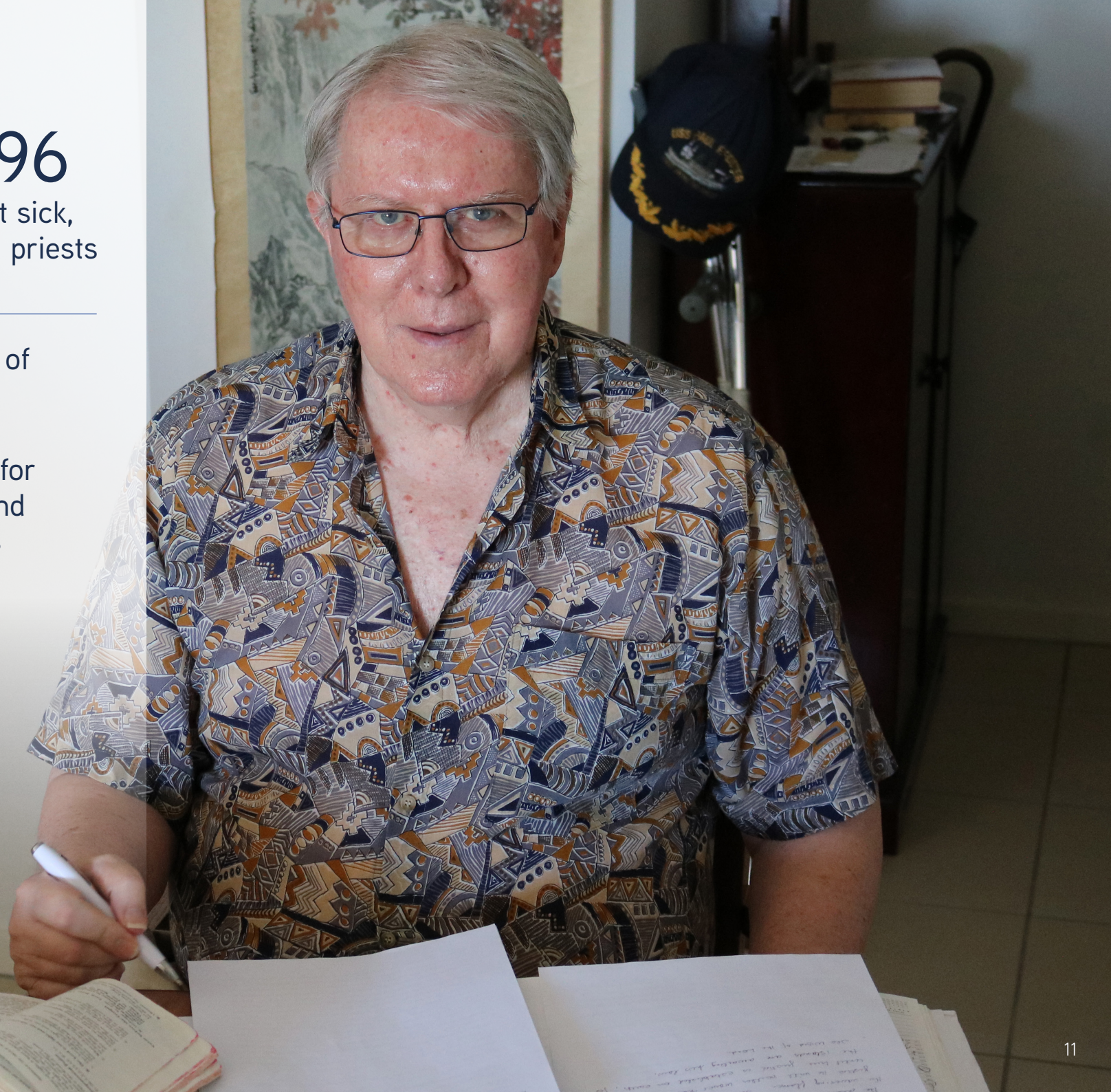

Sometimes it is the confronting things in life that serve as a reminder to live in love. To meet every person on our path with an open heart and without prejudice. This is what you do every time you support Centacare's social services.

It is not uncommon to assume that people in prison have made bad decisions and are paying their debt to society. Through Centacare's Prison Ministry, we learn that in many cases, bad decisions were made for them. In a 2020 report from Prison Ministry, almost half of those accessing the service suffered severe physical, sexual, and institutional abuse in their formative years. They have been living in and around 'the system' for as long as they can remember. On their release, they have no-one to turn to, and nothing to go back to.

Through your kindness and care, and through this ministry, you are working exactly where Jesus would be. You are making a tremendous difference to the people we serve.

Bringing families back to parish

Building a strong connection to their church in our youth is essential to ensure the future of our Catholic faith. It is this need that drives the Moorooka Salisbury parish's Youth and Family Mass Initiative. In 2020, the parish received vital funding through the Annual Grants Program to invest in this new initiative.

Mr Daniel Ibbott, the Youth and Family Mass Coordinator says "the success and growth potential of this Mass and its youth membership is already evident. A Youth Band has been organised along with a Youth Choir; with musicians and singers regularly committing to participate. Youth and young adults have offered their talents at other Parish Sunday Masses, by participating as Ministers of the Word, as cantors, and facilitating the Parish's Monthly Children's liturgies."

Parish priest, Father Dan Redhead, expressed his thanks to donors who support the Annual Grants Program. "Through the funding received from the Annual Grants Program we hope to nurture young people's spirituality through musical expression. Support from the program means more Catholic youth and young families will be drawn back to practise their faith within the community."

The Parish has also been able to appoint a Parish Youth Coordinator, Nick Kelly, who is excited to see what this new

position will mean for the parish. "This program supports present and future generations of our Church. Despite 2020 being a turbulent year, we are making progress in creating an authentic space for young people to feel like they belong in our Catholic Church today", Nick said.

Eternal Guardians of our faith

Joe and Mary Micallef are retired farmers and enjoy the peace and joy of life surrounded by their children and grandchildren. At age 83, Joe still goes for a two-hour-walk most mornings, and it is during this time that he thinks and reflects on his faith, and how it has guided him through life.

At age 16, Joe stepped off a boat and onto Australian shores with big dreams and high hopes. It was 1954, and he had left war-torn Malta to find work and a better life. In 1961, Joe moved to Mingoola near Tenterfield to take up tobacco farming, and quickly integrated with the predominantly Italian Catholic community. It was hard work, but it was a good life.

"I was an altar boy in Malta and even on the boat when I was coming to Australia. That continued when I got to Queensland," Joe said.

In 1963, Joe went on holiday to Malta, where he met and married Mary. "Malta was a British colony, so I had learned to speak English in school," Mary said. "Then, when I got to Australia, I had to learn Italian, because that was the language most of the people in Tenterfield and Texas spoke!"

Today, Joe and Mary attend Mass at Zillmere parish. For them, the Catholic Church has been a constant in a life with many changes. Joe reflects that "the street we lived on had three Catholic churches on it – one on each corner, and one in the middle! There were as many priests as were needed in those days. Not like now, when there are not as many."



That is why they give donations to support Holy Spirit Seminary. "When we received the information asking us to support the Seminary, back in 1988, I knew we had to make a donation and we have been doing it ever since. Without priests, there can be no Church," said Mary. "We raised our children in the Catholic faith and it is up to us, the faithful, to be guardians of our faith for future generations."

"My mum left money in her Will when she passed, and I will do the same. We made sure there is enough for our children, then wrote in a gift to the Church. When the time comes, we know our Church family will be taken care of as well."

Contributing to this initiative of the Church therefore gives me the opportunity to support and thank our priests, young and old - God bless them - and to provide education opportunities and a stable home life to students in need.”

Hope and a new start through education endowments

When Axel and his mother fled war-torn Burundi, they left with nothing but hope for a better future. The violence and loss left a permanent mark on this young man, but he is determined that it will be the catalyst towards a better future.

“Until recently my life was focussed on survival and not so much on studying. It has always been my dream to one day train to be a nurse because of the devastation I witnessed in Africa. This motivates me to focus on my dream despite the many challenges I face.”

In 2020, through the generosity of St James College alumni and a matched giving campaign, the school grew its Endowment fund by \$100,000. This means students like Axel can come to school wearing the Jimmies’ uniform with pride.

It means they have a library where they can study, and friends and mentors to guide and care for them.

There are many students at St James College whose families are living in crisis. Through the growing endowment fund, the school community provides the education these students need to see them being successful in the future.

Most endowments start small but, with prudent investment and care, grow to support major areas of ministry. New endowments can be created and named in a family’s or school’s honour, or in memory of a loved one – they are a perpetual gift to support vital works within the Church and wider community.

How endowments grow and fund good works for future generations

Capital is continuously added to the fund in the form of new donations and reinvested returns. The additional capital helps the endowment grow – our example is based on based on

8.8% annual growth (indicative of 10-year historical Australian average) with 5% for distribution to the beneficiary and 1% for administrative fees.

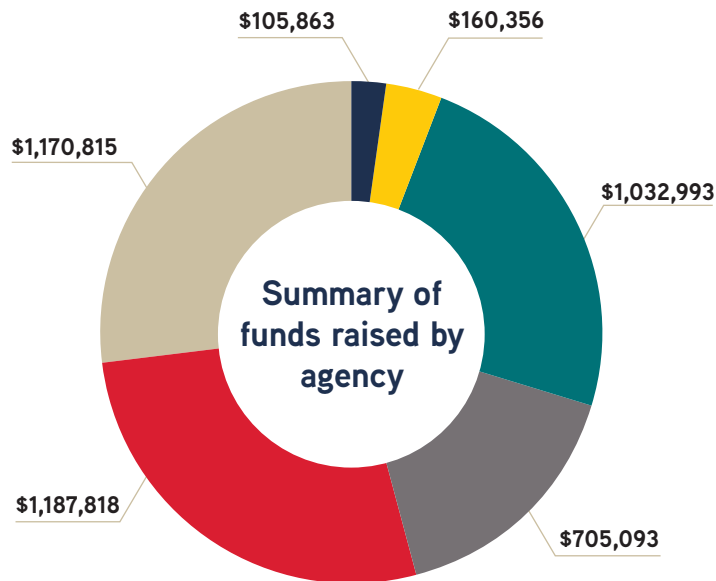

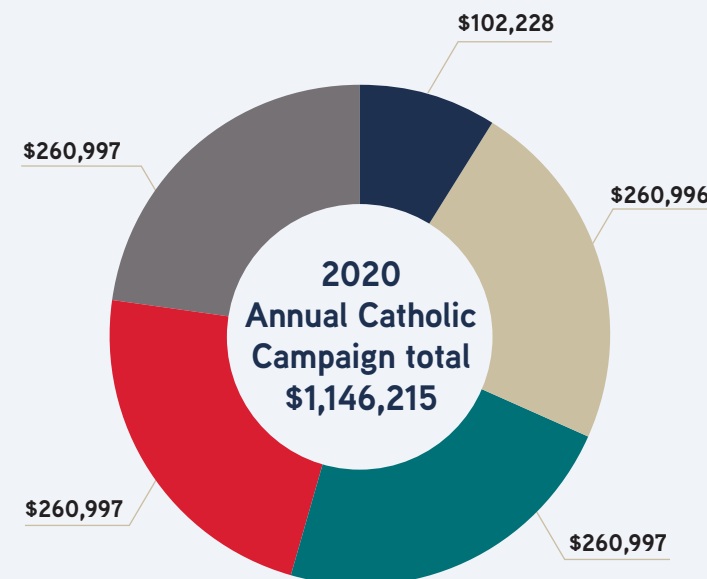
