As I continue my first year as Archbishop of Brisbane, I am still coming to know the breadth of this Archdiocese, its history and its people. What has struck me most, however, is the depth of faith and generosity already at work here.

Across our parishes, schools, agencies and ministries, I see the Church's mission lived out in practical and compassionate ways. I see a commitment to the dignity of each person and a willingness to respond to need with both care and creativity.

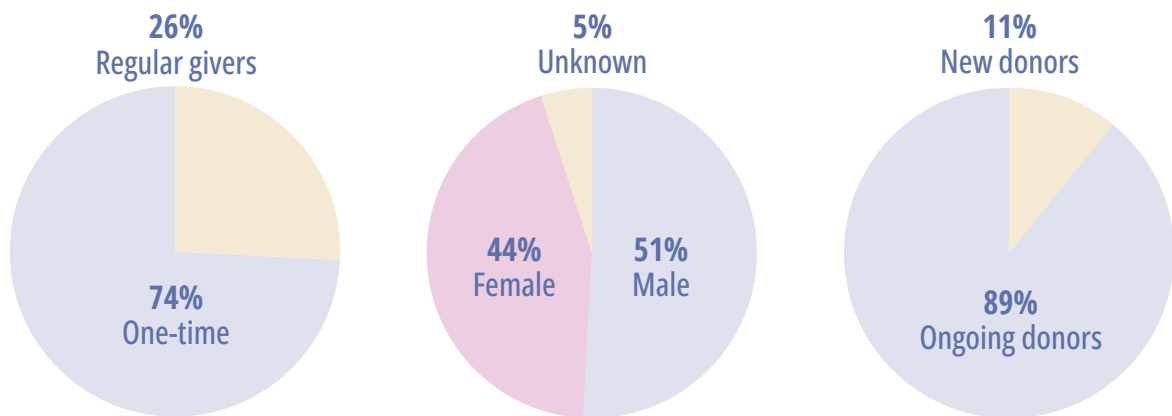

In February 2025, Holy Spirit Chapel at Banyo overflowed as 10 men began formal formation in the priesthood. It was one of the largest intakes in a generation.

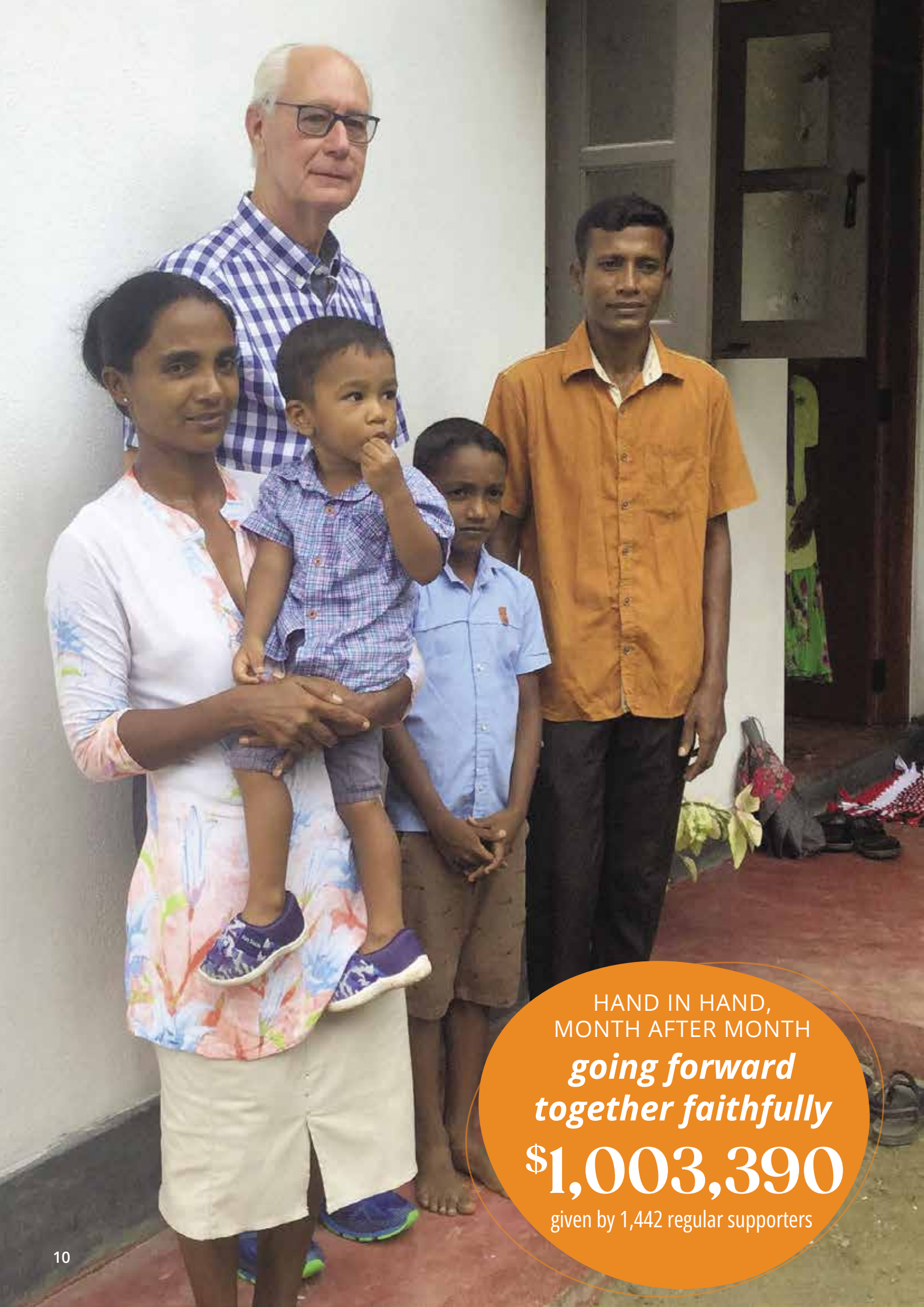

At the beginning of this journey, Holy Spirit Seminary became home. It continues to provide shelter as our seminarians are shaped through prayer, study, pastoral experience and community life. All thanks to the generous faith of our Catholic community.

Third-year seminarian Tito Sagato expresses his gratitude simply: “It is because of you that we are able to be formed. We’re thankful for the support of donors.”

A life spent 'paying it forward'

Eric Quevauvilliers doesn't give because he has plenty. He gives because he remembers what it felt like to have nothing certain ahead.

Born in Mauritius in 1945, the eldest of 10 children, Eric grew up watching his parents do something extraordinary. After a cyclone tore through the sugar estate where they lived, leaving families with little and nowhere to turn, his parents turned toward them. "At the age of 14, I first noticed how my parents were helping those in need," he recalls. He has been paying that lesson forward ever since.

His first donation came in 1974, while studying Mechanical Engineering in Durban, South Africa. A Mauritian priest invited him to support a struggling parish and though he felt he had little to offer, Eric said yes.

That instinct to reach out and help those in need has defined the decades that followed.

In 1986, Eric and his family immigrated to Brisbane, where he built a successful manufacturing business. But for Eric, success was always just the means to give more freely.

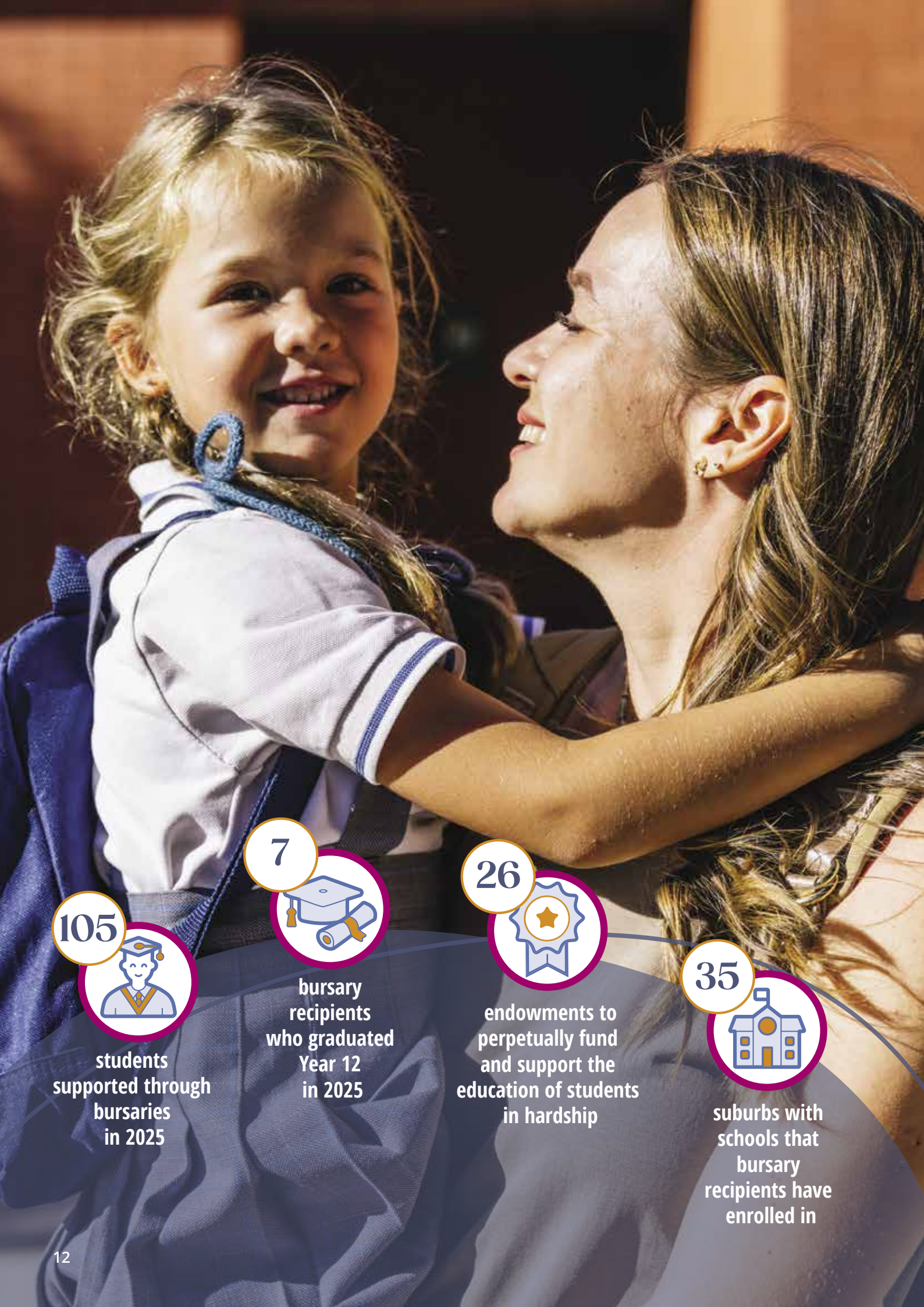
Through the Mary MacKillop Bursary Fund, Eric has opened the doors of Catholic education to children who might otherwise never walk through them. "I know that my donations will help a child achieve his or her goal and be a good person with a Catholic faith," he says. Through Centacare, his support has reached women fleeing violence, people in prison and families facing hardship.

And his generosity doesn't stop at Brisbane's borders. In Sri Lanka, Eric has funded housing, shipped medical supplies during COVID and donated mobility aids through the Oblates of Mary Immaculate. He gives not to be seen, but to make sure others can stand with dignity, knowing that God loves and cares for them.

When asked how much faith shapes his daily life, Eric answers "Very highly. I am blessed to have a strong faith."

Education through a Catholic lens

For a long time Tara and her mum, Jane, had nothing certain ahead of them. They had fled domestic violence and “home” was emergency accommodation at best.

Today, because of your kindness and care, Jane works, studies and mentors high school students. Tara wins academic awards at her Catholic school.

In between those two moments lies your generosity

A Mary MacKillop bursary provided a place for Tara in her Catholic school community. Her teacher says she has made steady progress across the curriculum, but notes a particular and joyful passion for religious education. “Tara arrives at school already knowing her Bible. She shares stories unprompted. She asks questions that stop you in your tracks” she says.

Outside the classroom, Tara learns piano and singing. At Church she joins in with enthusiasm, asking thoughtful, lively questions about God’s family. Tara is not just catching up – she is flourishing. Jane now offers young people exactly the steady presence and support that was offered to her.

Fr Leo Burke (1939–2025)

Fr Leo Burke was a telegram boy weaving through Brisbane's streets when the call to priesthood first stirred. Ordained at St Stephen's Cathedral in 1964, he never really slowed down. Serving as hospital chaplain, prison chaplain, supply priest and even cruise ship chaplain, going wherever he was needed.

At the celebration of his 60th anniversary of priesthood, surrounded by more than 100 friends and family, he explained the secret of his stamina: "I'm a people person. I just love being with people."

That love was his ministry. And it never ran out.



Fr John Chalmers (1948–2025)

Fr John Chalmers came into the world with malformed feet, wearing irons for the first 12 years of his life. He might easily have become discouraged. Instead, he found grace within his own vulnerability and it became his greatest gift to others.

As Archbishop Emeritus Mark Coleridge reflected at his funeral, that discovery "freed him to announce the Good News of peace far and wide." Fr John served in parishes, as seminary rector, and for 19 years with Centacare, walking closely with those carrying heavy burdens. He never stopped asking: "what kind of Church, for what kind of world?"



Fr Van Huong Nguyen (1949–2025)

Fr Huong Nguyen fled Vietnam and arrived in Brisbane in 1993, carrying with him a vocation that would require extraordinary patience.

He became one of the first Vietnamese priests to serve in the Archdiocese, ministering across parishes from Caboolture to Surfers Paradise. In his final years he spent countless hours as a hospital chaplain, sitting gently with patients and families in their moments of greatest fear.

You provide a lifeline

There is a quiet reality to domestic and family violence many people never see. Not the bruises. Not the trembling which accompanies fear. But a mother, sitting in a courthouse corridor waiting for her name to be called, who has gone without food for two days so her children can eat.

When a Centacare practitioner hands her a Coles voucher that day, she weeps. Not because of the money. Because someone has seen her.

In 2025, through generous donor support as well as the James Frizelle Charitable Foundation, Centacare's Family Relationship Services on the Gold Coast and Scenic Rim reached out to women and children from culturally and linguistically diverse backgrounds who had never asked for help before.

With your support Centacare could give them vouchers for groceries, clothing and fuel. Practical things that mean a mother can feed her children, keep the car running to get to school or buy shoes that actually fit. For children, age-appropriate backpacks arrive stocked with a comfort toy, drink bottle, journal and lunchbox. Small objects, but ones that say to a frightened child: - you matter and someone is thinking of you.

This is what your support through Centacare makes possible. Not grand gestures – the right gesture, at exactly the right moment, to exactly the right person. Proof you have not looked away.

Hands that never let go

When Tom was a boy growing up in Bendigo faith was woven into daily life. Priests at family dinners, at school Mass and at his hospital bedside their presence was a steady comfort.

“Back then the Church was just part of your life,” Tom recalls. “The priests had time for you. They were there when you needed them.”

That presence became most real when Tom’s father was dying of cancer. Through months of hospice care priests supported the whole family and his mother Gloria’s words after her husband’s death stayed with Tom forever: “I’ve got the Church. I’ve got St Killian’s. I’ve got Jesus.”


Those words would change Rhonda’s life too. Raised outside the Catholic faith, she watched Gloria’s quiet strength with deep admiration. “Watching her, I realised faith is there for you in good times and in hard times,” she says. When Rhonda became Catholic before marrying Tom she was embraced immediately and welcomed into a community that wraps its arms around you before you’ve even found your seat.

Wherever life has taken them – from Bendigo, Ballarat and eventually to Bribie Island – priests have walked alongside them, blessing their homes and encouraging their outreach to others.

It was hearing about retired priests like Fr Wrex Woolnough, grateful for his retirement unit yet quietly isolated, that stirred something in their hearts. They began to ask: what could they do in return?

The answer came clearly. They would leave a gift in their Will to The Priests Foundation. An open hand extended to the men who had extended theirs so many times before.

For Tom and Rhonda, it is a legacy written not in obligation, but in gratitude for a lifetime of priests present at bedsides, around kitchen tables, in joy and in sorrow.



“Without the priests, you haven’t got a Church,” Rhonda says. “They’ve always been there to help us – now we’ve got to care for them.”

From gratitude to generosity: The ripple effect of giving

“What I have, I like to give,” says Richard Malouf, once known as Queensland’s ‘pharmacy king’, of how he passes on the kindness he has received.

For him, generosity isn’t calculated, it is something he feels.

“When I was doing very well in business, I thought people had been good to me,” he says softly.

“And as you get older, you give back to the community, particularly to the poor.”

He recalls his first donation was to Our Lady’s Nurses for the Poor, also known as the Brown Sisters. His mother gave to them and that example stuck with him.

“I give to people where I know it’s going to make a real difference,” he says.

Over the years, alongside generously supporting the Catholic Foundation, Richard has helped establish housing for victims escaping domestic violence, contributed to aeromedical services and supported his former school, St Laurence’s College.

It’s the impact of his giving which moves him most.

“When I hear that something I’ve supported has done some good, that it’s actually gone where I wanted it to go, that makes me very happy,” he says.

Richard grew up in a Catholic family and used to be a regular at Sunday Mass till age slowed him. But faith is still his guide.

"If I get a call from a Catholic person, I'm probably inclined to look at it more favourably," he says.

Richard has been helping disadvantaged children attend Catholic school through the Mary MacKillop Bursary Fund.

"Family is my priority. I've got two grandchildren and I'm glad they've had a religious education," he says.

Through Centacare he supports individuals facing tough circumstances.


Born and bred in Brisbane, his generosity to his community goes beyond financial support.

He watched his father run a factory in Fortitude Valley and in his formative years learned good business leadership could go hand-in-hand with kindness and generosity.

Richard went on to set up his own business, Malouf Pharmacies.

"I enjoyed my work. I loved my staff," he says, talking about employees some who worked for 50 years – with whom he built a lifelong friendship.

Richard's belief in helping others to succeed in life underpins his support for the Church's mission of care, compassion and hope.

Youth-led intergenerational retreat helps vocations flourish

Over four winter days in June 2025, Tunnel Ridge Ranch echoed with laughter, prayer, conversation and song as 90 members of the Darra Jindalee faith community gathered for their fifth annual intergenerational retreat.

Led by the Darra Jindalee Youth Ministry, the gathering brought generations together as a united community of faith.

For the Darra Jindalee community, this annual event is part of a long-standing commitment to intergenerational mission and a belief that faith grows strongest when it is shared across ages, cultures and life stages.

Luisa Laughren, pastoral associate at Darra Jindalee Parish, sees it unfold year after year.

“The fruits from this retreat are profound. Just seeing that the heart is being transformed - obviously it’s the Holy Spirit at work but the Annual Grants Program through the Catholic Foundation is assisting in making this happen. We are developing leaders out of this,” she says.

“Three former participants are now seminarians, discerning priesthood for the Church. Another young leader is serving as a missionary, helping form students through the Immaculata Mission School.”

These seeds, planted in local communities, have taken root in vocation because of your generous support.

A lifetime of faithful hands

For nearly three decades Trish has been quietly placing her hand in God's, trusting what she gives will make a difference for wthose most in need. For her, giving has never been about recognition. It is simply an expression of faith, gratitude and doing what she believes is right.

A cradle Catholic, Trish and her husband Ben, who became Catholic a few years before they met, were already supporting parish collections for missions, retired priests and seafarers when the Annual Catholic Campaign was introduced. Moving to a monthly gift felt natural — a small steady gesture, month after month. "We just thought it was a good way to give," she says. "It was easier financially to contribute a little each month rather than larger amounts throughout the year."

Even on a modest pension after Ben retired, their commitment never wavered. "We still had a roof over our heads," she says. "If nobody gave, the agencies wouldn't exist."

Trish speaks passionately about caring for priests — those discerning their vocation and those who have served faithfully for many years. "They could have made very profitable careers in the outside world, but they've chosen to give their lives to the Church. They need our support," she says.

As a former nurse she also values pastoral care. She recalls a hospital chaplain who supported her and Ben during his final weeks: "He brought Communion twice a week and would sit and chat, quietly pray or recite from scripture. It was such a blessing at a very vulnerable time."

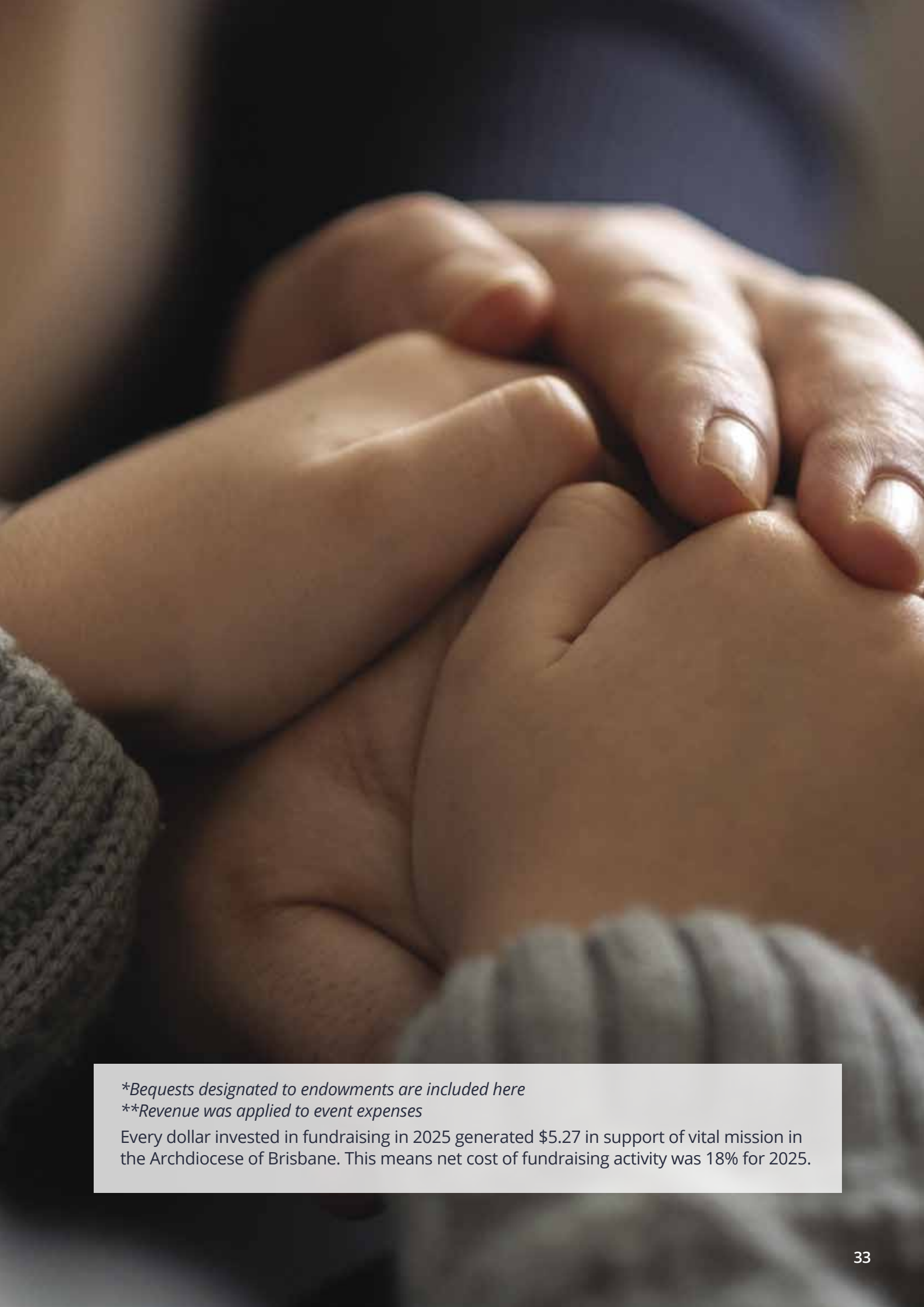
In 2025, Trish received a Quinn Medal from Archbishop Coleridge for 27 years of faithful giving. It's an honour she admits feels a little uncomfortable. "Most Catholics like to do their good works quietly," she laughs. She hopes Ben sees this honour and recognition, because "he was right there with me through most of this."

"Ben would have said a medal is unnecessary but I can almost hear him saying: 'our single gift is not huge on its own, but when you put them all together, they make a difference'."

For Trish, giving remains a simple act of faith and belonging. "I feel very much part of the Church. And I'm grateful we've been able to do our small part," she says.
